The Grooming & Exploitation Funnel

1. Initial Contact & Grooming

Predators use "minor-friendly" apps like social media and gaming sites. They build trust by feigning shared interests, offering gifts, and creating a sense of secrecy.



2. Coercion & Content Generation

Once trust is established, the predator coerces the child into sending explicit images or videos, often called "self-generated" CSAM.



3. Sextortion & Blackmail

With explicit material in hand, the predator blackmails the victim, demanding more content, money, or sexual acts under threat of public exposure. Teenage boys are increasingly the targets of financial sextortion.



4. Severe Psychological Trauma

This cycle leads to devastating consequences, including anxiety, depression, and suicide. Since 2021, over three dozen teenage boys have died by suicide as a result of sextortion.

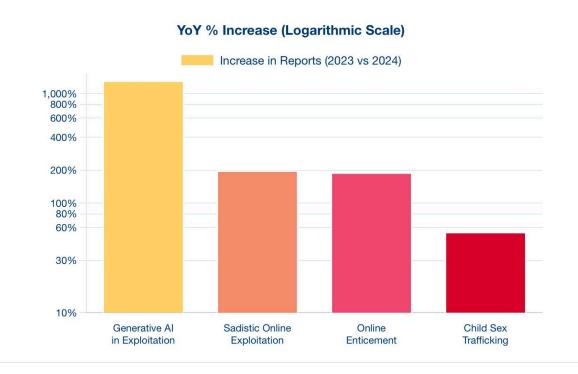

NCMEC CyberTipline Report Increases (2023 vs. 2024)

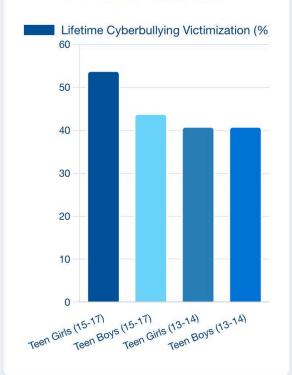

Victimization by Gender & Age

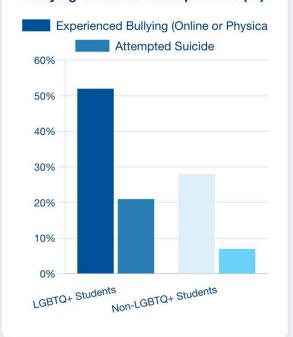
Older teen girls face the highest rates of online harassment. This chart compares the lifetime victimization rates between genders across different teen age groups.
